

The first humans in the Americas were about 250 people who migrated from Siberia around 15,000 years ago, according to a study published in Genetics and Molecular Biology. Researchers collected DNA from 10 members of indigenous groups in Central and South America, 10 Siberian individuals and 15 people from China, looking for information about the original founding group. Most Indigenous languages in Australia likely originated from a remote spot in far north Queensland as recently as 4,000 years ago, before slowly spreading across the country, a new study has claimed.

A team of researchers led by Dr. Olivier Morin at the Max Planck Institute for the Science of Human History in Jena, Germany have released a mobile app, the Color Game, designed to study how human languages evolve. What We Must Do to Develop Future Citizens

We're in the car driving home, and my fourteen year old son and his best friend are in the back seat, engaged in their usual sports banter. "Did you know Jake Peavy is legally blind?" my son asks his friend, Henry. "What?" says Henry. "A pitcher can't be blind! You're making that up."

But my son is insistent. "No," he says. "He is legally blind. I'm not making it up." He pulls out his phone and types "Jake Peavy blind" into the search bar and starts reading an ESPN article aloud. Henry laughs and asks, "What the heck does that even mean? I mean, can you be illegally blind?" Another quick search and they are both hovering over the device, reading the definition of "legally blind."

These two boys, along with most every other kid across the country, are growing up with search engines in their back pockets, integrating research into their day-to-day conversations, proving their points and investigating where they are more curious.

Can Education Produce More Civically Engaged Students? You Bet, Study Finds

U.S. public schools were founded on the principle that there is a common good in acquiring the knowledge and skills to be effective citizens. But despite that belief—or perhaps because it's so ingrained in our thinking about schools—there just isn't a lot of empirical research to back it up.

Now, **a new study** shows that students who enrolled in a Democracy Prep charter school, which places a specific emphasis on citizenship and voting, had **much higher rates of registering to vote and actually voting** than a control group of students.

Put another way: Yes, schools absolutely can influence students' later civic engagement.


