Dear Pennsylvania social studies educators:

NCSS is excited to currently be planning our 102^{nd} National Council for the Social Studies Conference. The conference will take place December 2-4, 2022 in Philadelphia and we are planning for an *in-person* conference. PCSS is actively involved with PCSS President Jason Raia heading up the conference planning committee and our President-Elect, Georgette Hackman, on the NCSS Board and handling local arrangements. This note is sent on behalf of Jason and Georgette. As an educator in Pennsylvania, we would like you to participate in one or more of the following opportunities leading up to the conference.

- Serve on a Conference Program Team. Conference Program Teams will make the final recommendations for which conference proposals to accept. Each team will have a leader who will work with the team to schedule 1-2 virtual meetings between April 20 May 6 during which time you will collaboratively complete the final selections. You will also need to devote time to independently review the proposals prior to the meeting(s).
- Serve on the Local Arrangements Committee. The Local Arrangements Committee will work over the next few months to prepare to host over 4,000 educators in Philadelphia in December. The work will consist of meetings to identify evening and other activities for educators to participate in while in Philadelphia as well as organizing the hundreds of volunteers that will be needed. This work will take place from May December.
- Volunteer for the Conference. We need hundreds of regional volunteers who will meet and greet attendees, work registration, facilitate session rooms, monitor buses for tours, clinics, and excursions, and work in the Exhibit Hall. There are registration discounts for volunteers. This work will take place from December 1 4 and you will get to choose the days/times that work for you.



- Webinar. More Than A Game. A Look at US-Japan Relations through Baseball. May 16, 7-8 pm ET.
 - US diplomatic historian Thomas Zeiler explores baseball as a window to teach about power, culture, and profits in US-Japanese/Asian relations, with a focus on the 20th century.
- Seminar. Reconsidering East Asia in the Early Modern World: Maritime Histories, 1350-1750.
 - June 13 July 21.
 - Developing research in the field of maritime history offers new perspectives and understandings of diplomatic, economic, and cultural connections that intertwine the countries of East Asia from the 14th to 18th centuries. Through asynchronous and live sessions with leading scholars, participants will explore early modern geographies and mapping, Zheng He's tribute missions, and the contributions of pirates and family trade dynasties in linking the region.
- Contemporary Issues Course. China's Search for a Green Future: Clean Energy, Air, and Water. July 9 31.
 - China has committed to becoming a leader in renewable energy technology. Still, air pollution, water scarcity, and overall environmental degradation continue to impact the health of local people and challenge China's continued economic growth. Through three week-long case studies, participants will examine how the Chinese government and citizen activist groups are responding to these challenges. Data: Teachers need second jobs to pay the bills

Eighteen percent -- or around 600,000 -- of US public-school teachers have a second job outside of the classroom during the school year, according to data from the National Center for Education Statistics. In a National Education Association Research survey of more than 1,300 teachers of prekindergarten through grade 12, 41% reported having a second job -- such as delivering groceries or working in a restaurant -- during 2019, with most of those interviewed for this article saying it was demoralizing that their teaching salaries are insufficient to meet their expenses. **Full Story**: EdSurge (3/30)

The 465 acres of land, where Captain John Smith fought and displaced Native Americans, will soon feature a historically accurate 16th-century village ...



How 2 First Nations are restoring the caribou population

The Saulteau and West Moberly First Nations in British Columbia have been trying to increase the local caribou population, which once was a source of food for Indigenous peoples before the arrival of European settlers, mining, logging and dams, says West Moberly Chief Roland Willson. Working with universities since 2013, the efforts -- including restoration of habitats, hunting wolves to reduce predators and protecting pregnant caribou -- have increased the herd from 38 to 114 animals, which researcher Clayton Lamb calls remarkable and "unprecedented." A group of high-school students in Pennsylvania lobbied the state legislature to make the Hershey's Kiss the state's official candy as part of a civics project that began when the students were in middle school and was designed to teach them about the legislative process. Pa. House approves schools serving whole milk

The Pennsylvania House overwhelmingly adopted legislation that would allow schools to serve whole milk, which is restricted by federal mandates that require schools to offer either skim or 1% milk. Officials say it is unclear whether the bill would hold up in court if it is challenged, though bill sponsor Rep. John Lawrence says the measure was created to ensure that the milk is processed and sold in Pennsylvania and therefore would not fall under the federal government's regulation of interstate commerce. **Full Story:** Lancaster Farming (Pa.) 

(Editor's Note) The World, Once Upon a Time

In 1957, world history texts usually had less than 10 pages devoted to Africa. Apparently little has changed in textbook treatment of Africa and CHOICES has opted to fill the gap The following is an excellent attempt to correct this omission.

Africa is the world's second-largest continent consisting of 54 countries and a population of more than 1.2 billion people. Yet this important continent is often overlooked in history books. Three units from the Choices Program can help you integrate Africa into your world history curriculum:

- Colonization and Independence in Africa
- Nigeria: History, Identity, and Change
- Freedom in our Lifetime: South Africa's Struggle

These curriculum units include four case studies and lessons that explore geography, fiction, artifacts, poetry, politics, resistance, activism, and more! Explore the curriculum units below.

Colonization and Independence in Africa

How did Africans resist European colonialism? This unit examines four case studies of colonization and resistance: Algeria, Ghana, Kenya, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. It explores the challenges of independence and the legacies of colonia nit.

Just finished reviewing *Korea's Place in Teaching Social Studies*, a powerful volume for teachers. As I perused the materials designed for distribution to students, I began to recall my time as Dept. Head, teaching four classes, and having three preparations. Then I remembered Fenton's "*New Social Studies*" which furnished ample reproducible handouts with the textbooks. Teachers with multiple preps do not have time to reproduce the handouts in this book. Would it be possible to offer these on-line for a fee? Maybe this service is already available but I did not see any evidence that it is. The service could be accessed for a fee with availability via a pass word. This could be a definite way to serve teachers as well as improve the teaching of social studies and provide some much needed material on Asia.
